### Daily Checks

It is the drivers responsibility to carry out daily checks on all fluid levels, controls, lights, tyres etc

### Pre Start Checks and Safety

**! It is the drivers responsibility to ensure they meet all the “Land Transport NZ” requirements at all times**

#### This includes things like:

- ! The driver has the appropriate licence for what they are driving
- ! The vehicle has a current WOF or COF
- ! The vehicle has a current registration
- ! Road User Charges (if applicable) are current
- ! Dangerous Goods Licence (if required)
- ! Log Books are used (if applicable)
- ! Driving Hours, On Duty Hours and Days off are adhered to
- ! Over Width and/or Weight requirements are met
- ! Speed limits are adhered to at all times

#### **All LTSA infringements are the hirers responsibility!**

All panel and glass damage is not covered by Hirequip's Damage Waiver Insurance

### When Operating

**As this instruction sheet is generalised on all our vehicles please ensure you are briefed fully on the particular vehicle you are hiring**

Always drive in a manor as per the New Zealand Road Code and have courtesy for other road users

Always check vehicle load ratings and ensure you work within them (this includes Combined Maximum Gross Weight – EG vehicle, trailer and it's load)

When carrying a load always ensure it is securely fastened so it can't shift around while the vehicle is moving, if possible put the load against a head or side board. Place heavier items at the bottom, on trailers position loads as close to the axle as possible and avoid placing heavier loads towards the rear of the trailer
